





HOSPICE & NODA



No One Dies Alone (NODA) volunteers provide companionship to dying inpatients who do not have family or other loved ones able to be with the patient during the end of their life. "Whether talking softly, playing relaxing music, or simply holding vigil, our NODA volunteers act as a reassuring presence at the bedside of the dying patient when no friends or family are available to be with them during their final days of life," said NODA Coordinator and Nurse Educator Rachel Thurnher. NODA volunteers are given specialized training in compassionate communication, comfort care, death and dying, health care ethics, and spiritual care.

Funding for the No One Dies Alone (NODA) program was provided through unrestricted donor dollars to support patient patient care enhancement projects. The program is available to all qualified patients at Cape Fear Valley Medical Center and Valley Hospice House.









CANCER CARE

"Since opening in October, 2024, Cape Fear Valley Cancer Center – Lillington has made a huge impact on cancer care in the Harnett community. Patients are able to get state-of-the-art cancer care right here in the community without any travel. The spacious treatment area accommodates patients and their families, and families have been very appreciative of being able to accompany their loved ones to provide supporte during treatment. Examples of programs we support:

- Cold Cap Therapy Program for patients who experience hair loss during treatment
- Electric Golf Cart to transport patients from parking lot to front door of Cancer Center
- Mammograms, housing and utility support and Lyft transportation vouchers for patients in need
- Art Therapy Sessions to provide comfort to patients
- Breast Cancer Education Bags for newly diagnosed patients
- Vein Finders to assist healthcare providers in finding a patient's veins

MEDICATION and NUTRITIONAL ASSISTANCE



The Pediatric Playroom at Cape Fear Valley Medical Center is a safe and cheerful space where children can be kids, even while in the hospital. Led by a Child Life Therapist and stocked with toys,

books and video games, the playroom gives young patients a chance to play, laugh, and connect with others during their stay. These moments of fun and normalcy help ease anxiety, support healing, and provide comfort for both children and their families.

Expanding Behavioral Health for Adolescents

Cape Fear Valley Health is committed to meeting the critical behavioral health needs of young people in our community. Dr. Malcolm Vaught, one of our dedicated behavioral health physicians, works daily with adolescents who need care, guidance, and support during difficult times. That commitment is growing stronger with the construction of a new Adolescent Inpatient Psychiatric Unit in Harnett County. This facility will bring specialized, compassionate care closer to home, ensuring that teens and families have access to the resources they need to heal and thrive.

Donor support strengthens families during their NICU journey by providing comfort, faith, and compassionate care.

In our Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU), every moment counts. Families like the Armstrongs experienced firsthand how our team provides not only advanced medical treatment but also the compassion and guidance parents need during the most uncertain days. Empowering families to play an active role in their baby's care creates moments of comfort and connection that are just as vital as medicine.

For the Armstrong family, that meant gentle instruction on holding their fragile newborn, reassurance during long nights, and the comfort of knowing they were never alone. The NICU is a place where babies heal and families find hope — and with donor support, we can continue providing this extraordinary, family-centered care to the tiniest



COMMUNITY SUPPORT



The Community Paramedic Program expands the role of the traditional EMS provider with a goal to improve health outcomes and reduce readmissions. Patients receive assistance through scheduling appointments, managing medications and implementing home visits. The team works with pneumonia, COPD, congestive heart failure and other chronically ill patients.

Cape Fear Valley Health Foundation supports this program by providing scales, pulse oximeters, shower chairs, medications and blood pressure monitors.


